We will host our Title I/Curriculum Night on Thursday, 9-21, our annual Community Resource Night/Fall Carnival on 10-26, our Muffins for Military celebration to honor our veterans on 11-16. Each year we sponsor a food drive in November and an Angel Tree during November - December. We will host two musical programs this year, one in December and one in the Spring. Our scheduled Student-Led Conferences will take places Nov. 6-8, 3-5 p.m. and Jan. 29-31, 3-5 p.m. In addition, we will host four awards program to recognize and honor student achievement.	
Safe and Orderly schools	The Cumberland County School System (CCS) has a commitment to excellence in providing a safe and healthy workplace. Waivers
